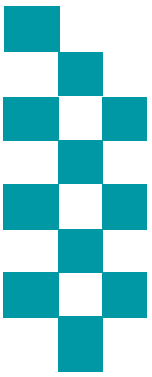

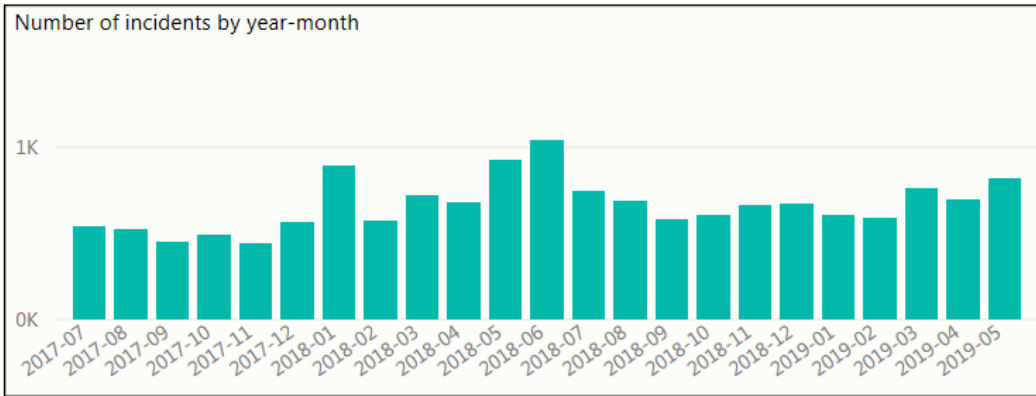

Occurrences involving a person(s) with a mental health qualifier



- The monthly volume of incidents where Mental Health is seen as a factor involved remains static with the exception of January 2018 and Summer 2018 where we saw a rise in incidents.
- Incidents with a Mental Health tag have accounted for 8.8% of all incidents in the last 22 months

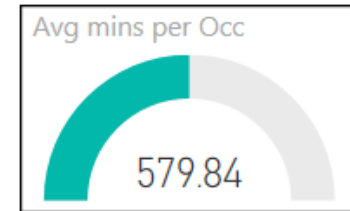
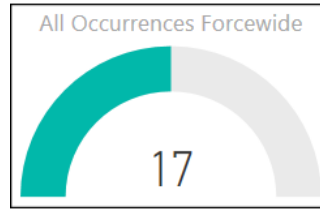
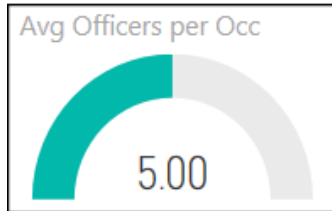

Use of police custody as a place of safety

Police custody must only be used for s.136 MHA detainees in highly exceptional circumstances, e.g. genuinely unmanageable risks of resistance, aggression, violence or escape, or if also detained for an offence. We scrutinise every use of custody in these circumstances. Further details are included on the following slide.

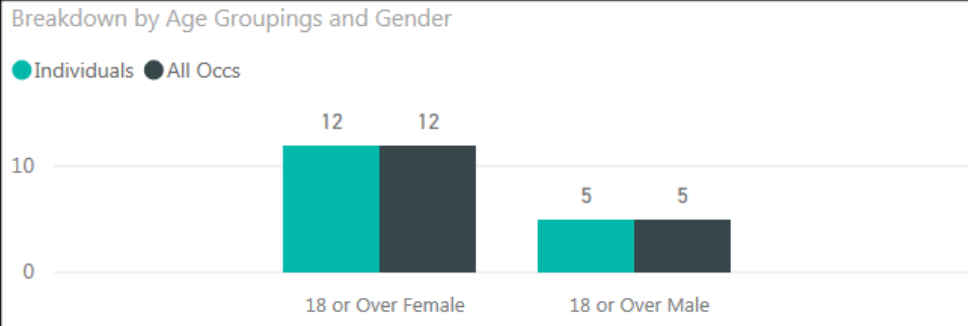

Gender/Age Breakdown and Repeat Nominals



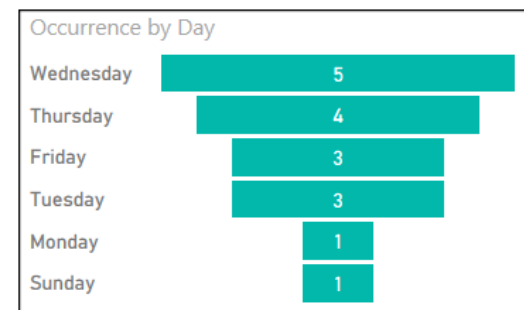

Occurrence by Day

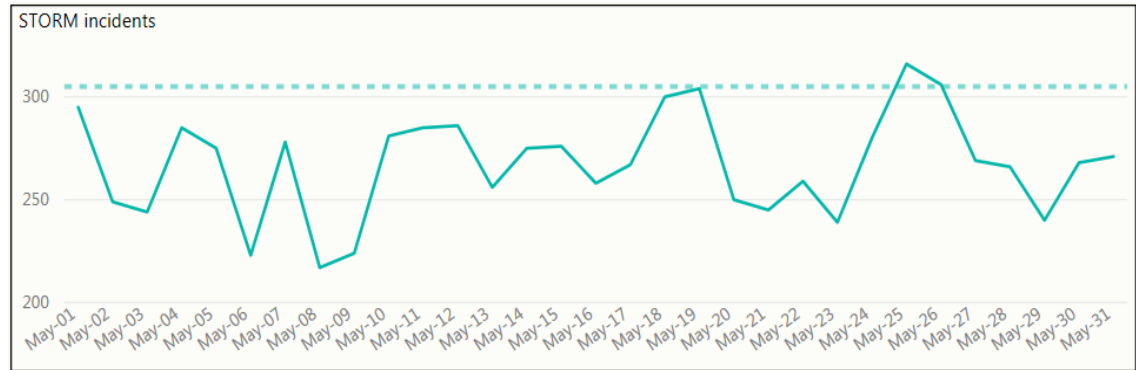

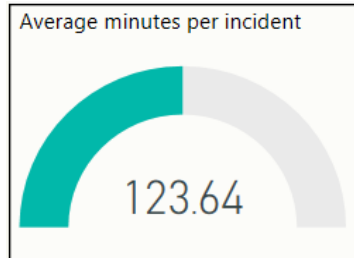

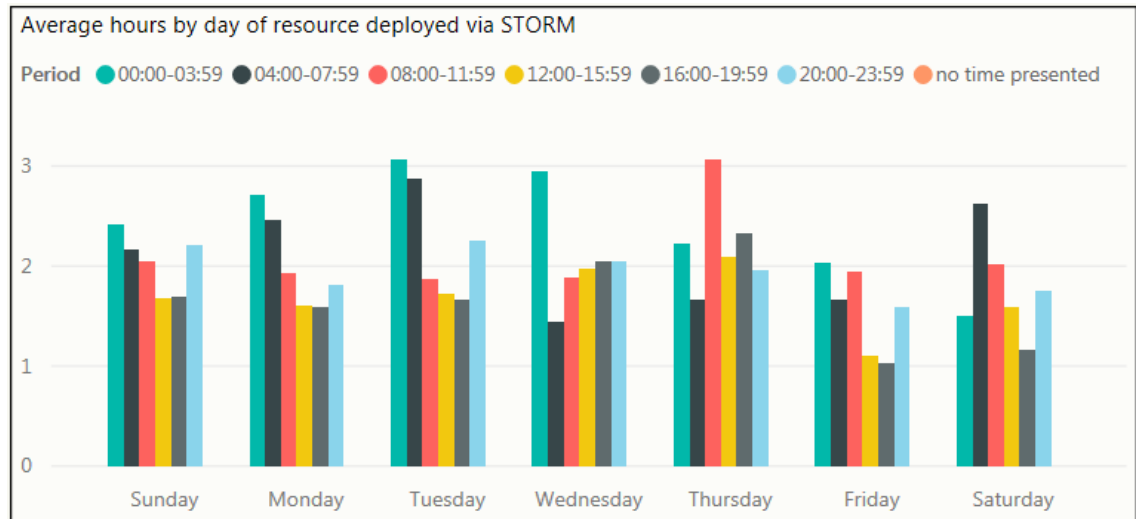
Incident Volumes by Date

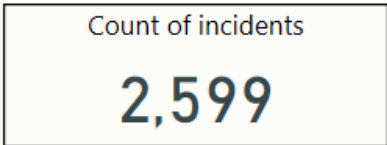

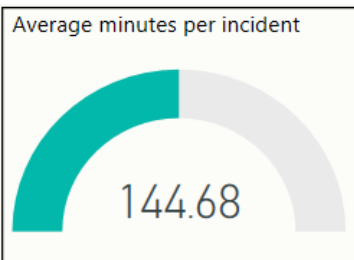
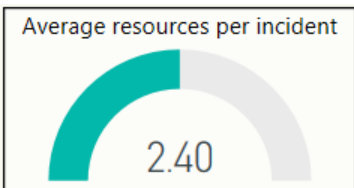

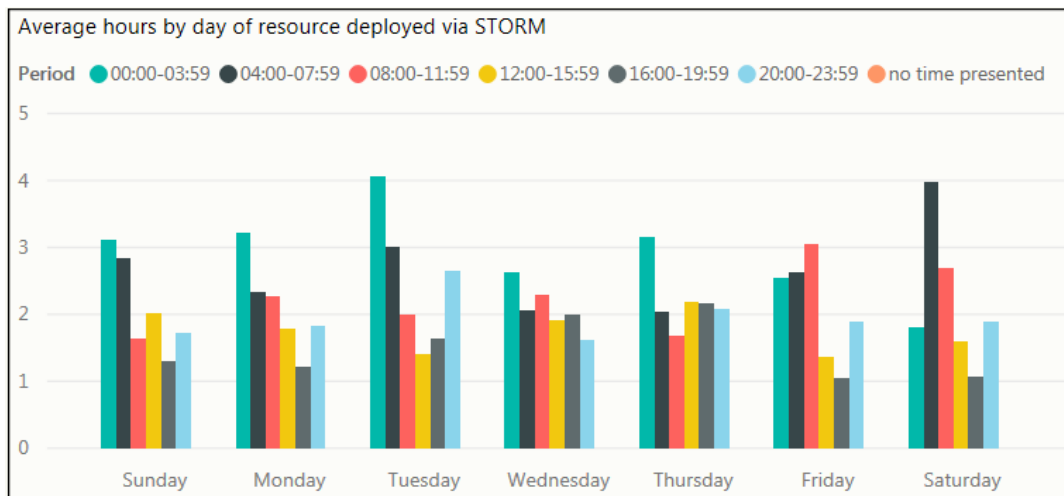
Incident Volumes by Date

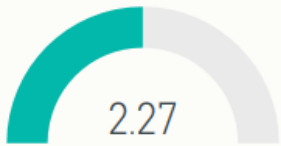

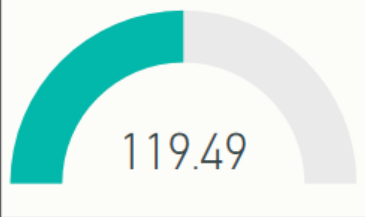

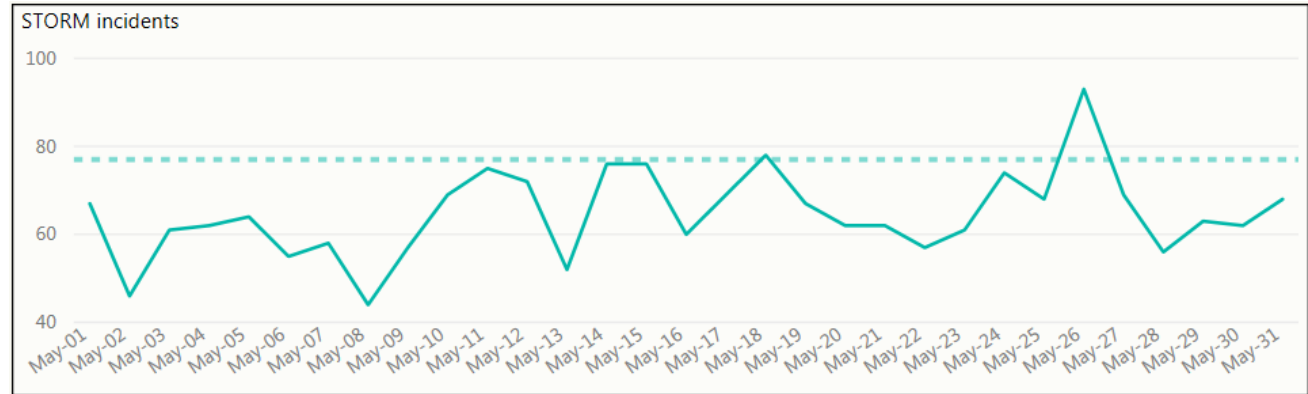
Average resources per incident



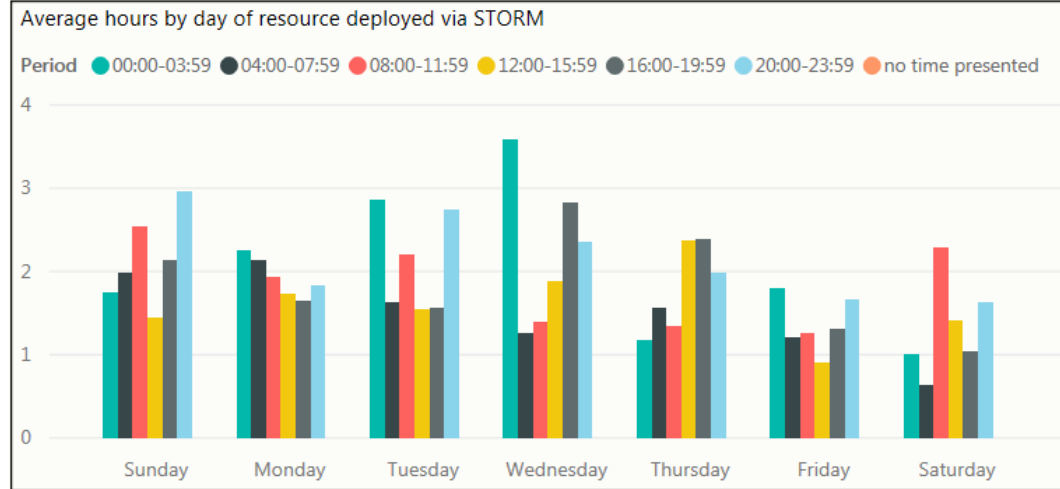
Average minutes per incident

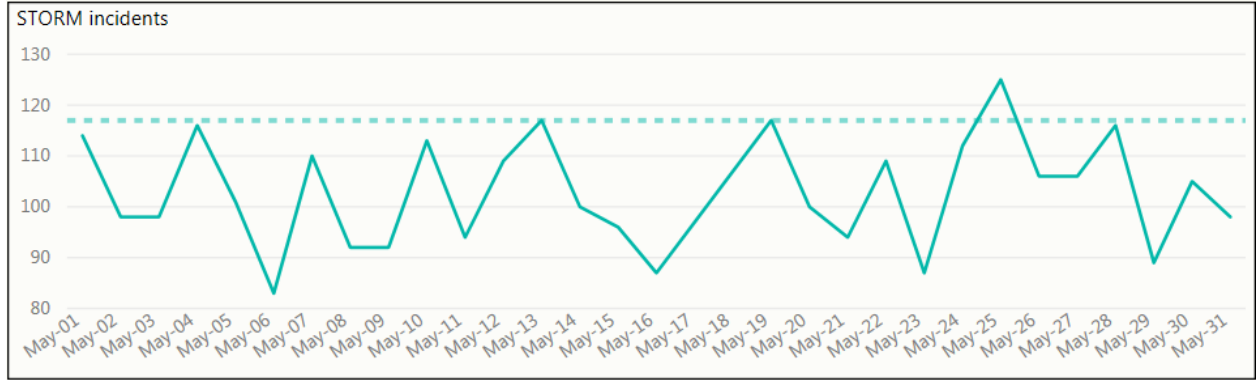
Count of all Incidents and type



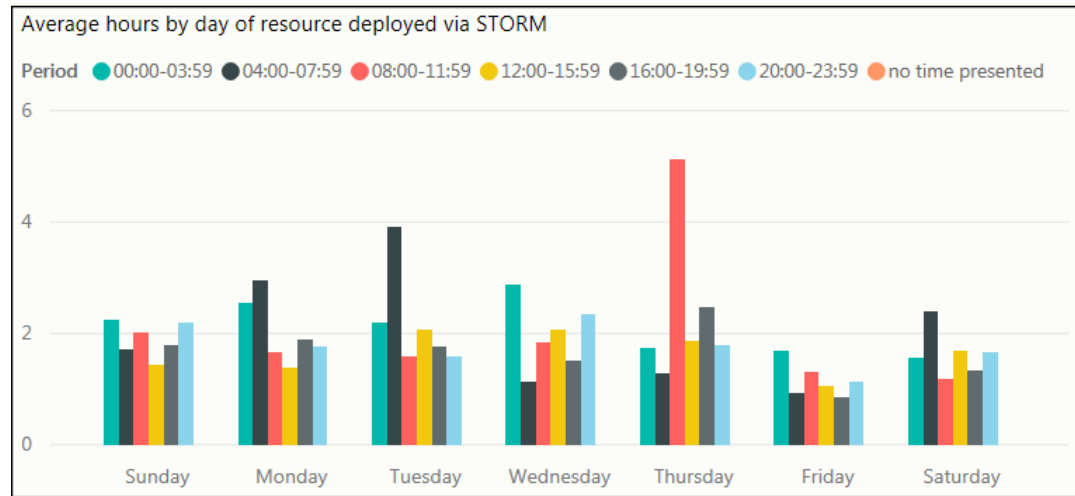
Average Officers and Time Spent

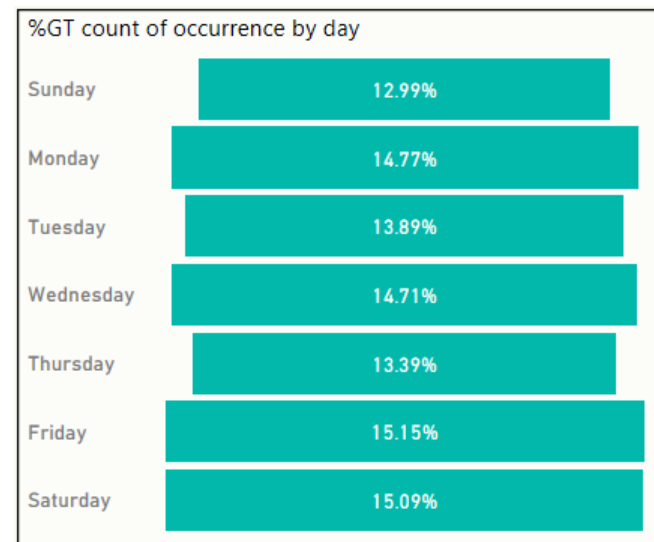

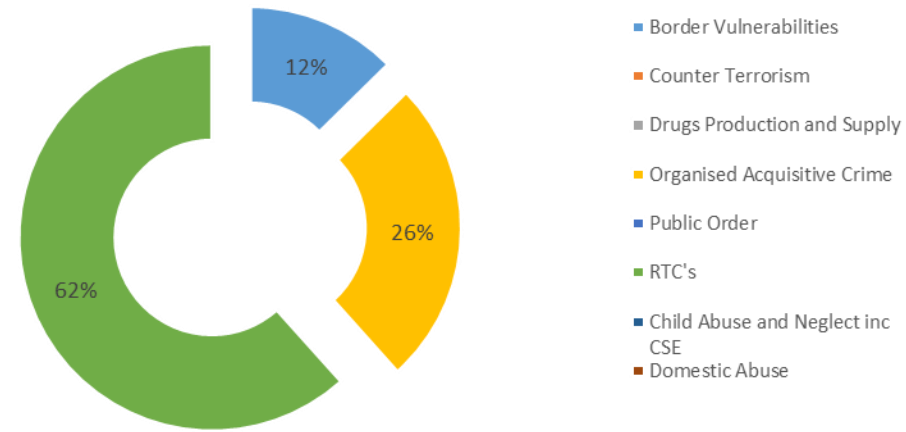
- ASB incidents continue to decrease in all SNCs
- PSW type incidents continue to be the long term increases experienced across all SNCs. Concern for Safety incidents are showing long term increases as the Police become the first point of contact for vulnerable people, which is reflected in national reporting

Proactivity: How has proactive policing contributed to control strategies? (May 2019)

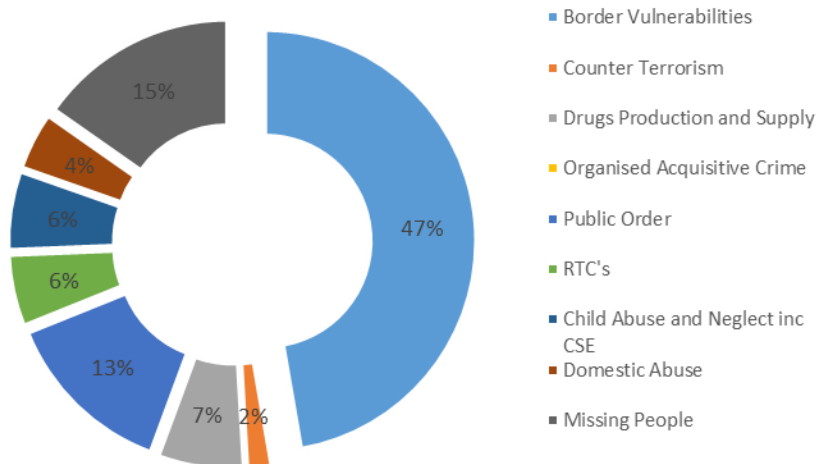
Split of 902 hours appointed to FSU



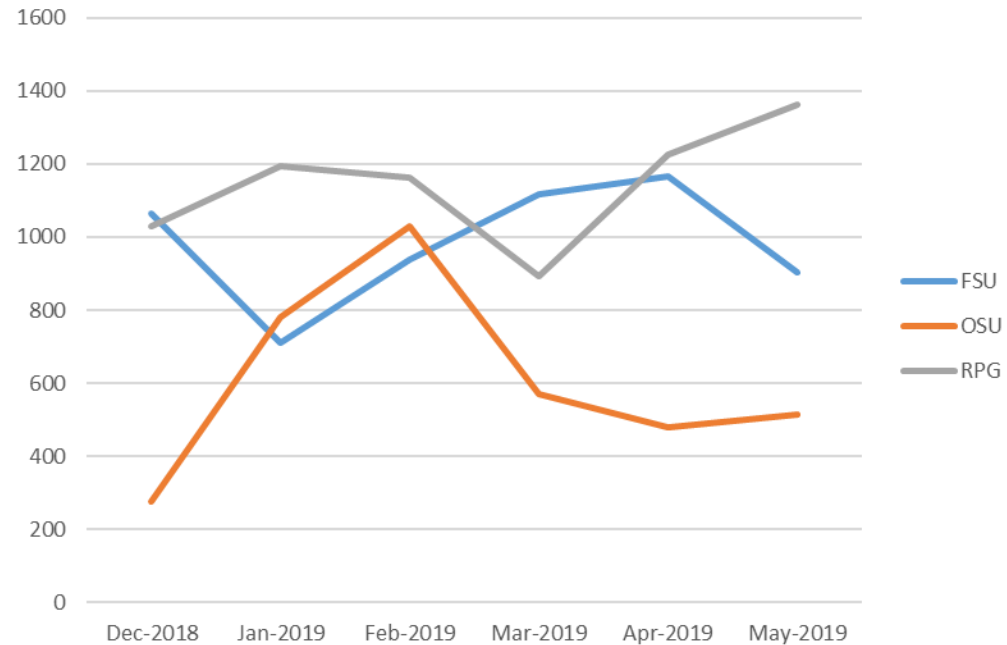
Split of 1361.25 hours appointed to RPG

Rural Task Force

Caring for the Vulnerable

Work with Firearms Licensing ongoing to identify vulnerable people and opportunities for early intervention using partners.

Ongoing collaboration with NHS Tees, Esk, Wear Valley Trust, Yorkshire Agricultural Society, NFU, NYCC, which has developed a campaign to offer support and intervention to those suffering with mental health issues in rural communities “Down on The Farm” – launching late June.

Op Woollen, Op Woodchip and Op Crucible aim to provide proactive prevention advice to farms, businesses and historic assets at risk.

Property Marking Events are regularly held to provide reassurance and a deterrent against theft.

Ambitious Collaboration

National week of action on rural crime planned for October.

Regional Rural and Wildlife Crime meeting planned for June to share intelligence and information, which will plan OP Checkpoint for Q3, and other multi force operational dates for cross border operations set with Cleveland, Durham and Lancs.

Local meetings with neighbouring forces occur monthly between PCs / PCSOs on area, and neighbouring force NPTs. to share intelligence and operational activity.

Op Owl dates planned for later in the year tackling raptor persecution with partners and land owners, national Raptor Awareness Day run in NY 11th June, Op Owl being launched nationally.

Op Eyeball carried out in June with Craven and Harrogate LA, RPG, DVSA, DVLA to target fly tipping and other offences, 170+ vehicles stopped, 10 vehicle prohibitions and seizures; dates planned throughout rest of year.

National Park Authorities and AONB in NYP collaborate with RTF on various work streams including tackling wildlife crime, and use of volunteers.

Collaboration with 12 forces nationally to develop a What Works strategy around poaching.

Work ongoing with partners to disrupt criminal activity of OCGs especially Existence, involving National Food Crime Unit.

Reinforcing Local Policing

Identify and support local priorities including Op Night (Craven), fuel thefts in Selby, quad thefts and burglaries on Northern border.

Op Sidekick is an intelligence led operation to proactively tackle plant and machinery theft through a series of tactics, and continues.

Op Extractor investigation and proactive response to a series of burglaries and thefts in the north of the county, as well as OCG management.

Op Existence investigation into livestock theft and subsequent sale, OCG management and working with partners such as NFCU to tackle OCG.

Support given to local policing through proactive arrests, investigation of crime series, and intelligence led proactive patrol.

Enhancing Customer Experience

Op Harvester works with volunteers based in community groups to actively work with local officers to tackle rural criminality in their areas. There are now eighteen across North Yorkshire comprising 200+ PSVs.

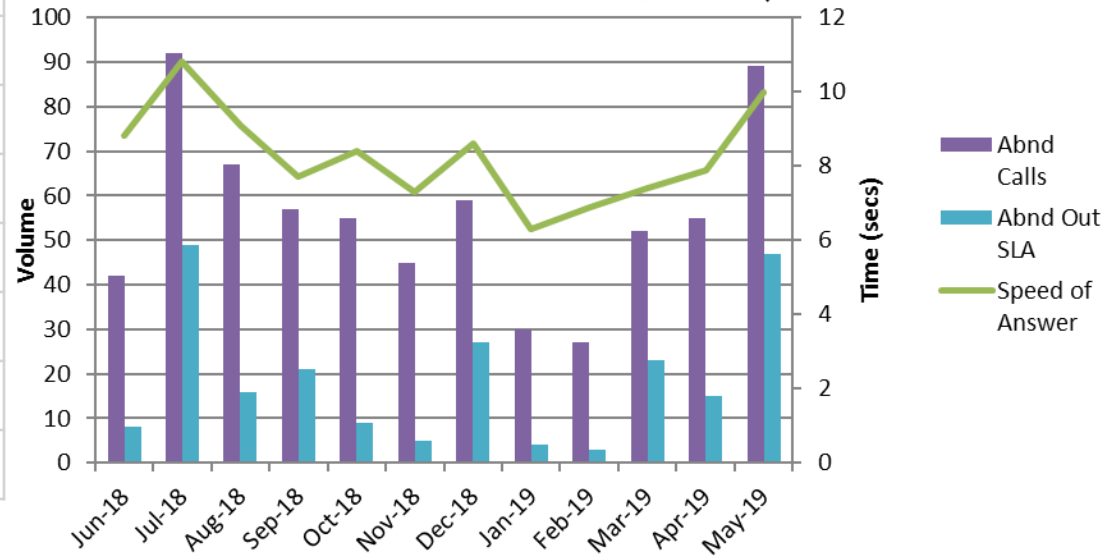
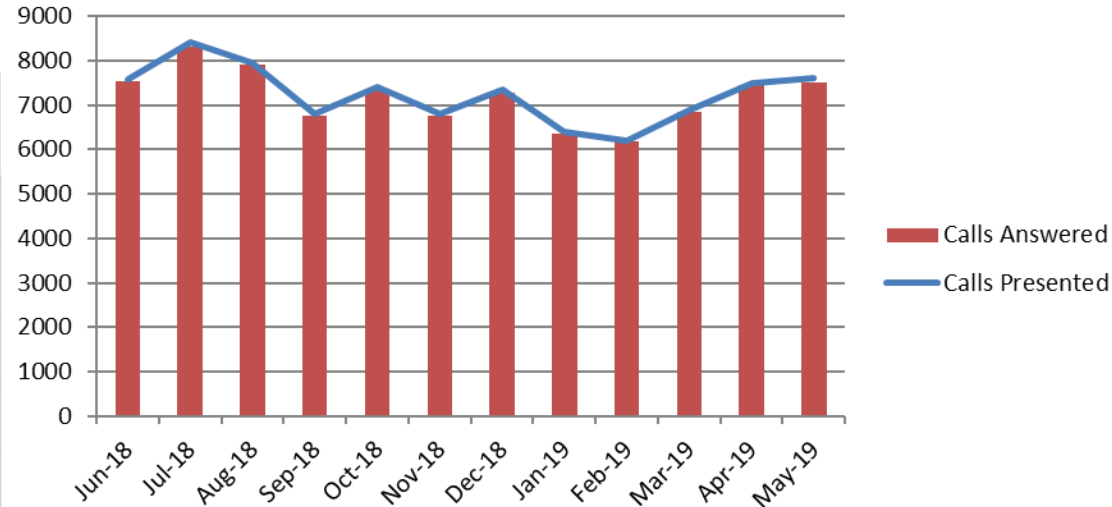
WhatsApp has recently been piloted as a tool to improve communication between community groups and the police. This has been successful three areas, with a view to using this force wide soon.

Numerous local events are still being attended on area, ranging from shows, to local marts, to farm open days, enabling contact, engagement with, and information flow between the town and rural public. Recent events attended include Farm Open days, York Agri Mart and local shows.

Internal SharePoint and Intranet sites are up and running to communicate the work of RTF to police colleagues.

- Call duration is consistently over 5 minutes for 15 months.
- The Home Office / Vodafone 101 report quotes 21 other forces having lower volumes of 101 calls than North Yorkshire Police. The national 101 increase April 2019 – May 2019 is 4.14% North Yorkshire Police’s total calls via 101 has increased by 7% since April 2019.

GLOSSARY

Glossary

- ASB = Anti-Social Behaviour
- CMS = Community Messaging System
- Concern Safety = Concern for Safety – includes all occurrences where there is a concern for an individual's safety or welfare
- Fraud Offences = These are not included in the crime statistics as they are not reported by forces to the Home Office. Instead these crimes are passed to Action Fraud and statistics are collated by that agency
- FSU = Firearms Support Unit
- I Grade = priority assigned by control room for an incident requiring ImmEDIATE police response
- KSI = A casualty Killed or Seriously Injured as a result of a Road Traffic Collision on a public road
- MCU = Major Crime Unit
- Miss Pers = Missing Person
- MO = Modus Operandi
- NPS = New PsychoaSubstances is the official term for Legal Highs
- NTE = Night Time Economy
- OCG = Organised Crime Group
- OSU = Operational Support Unit – a specialist unit which is deployed around the force through tactical bidding process
- OPL = Over Prescribed Limit typically the term used to describe failing a breath test
- PCSO = Police Community Support Officer
- PSW = Personal Safety and Welfare
- Resolved Outcome = A crime where an offender has been dealt with through sanction or restorative justice.
- RPG = Roads Policing Team
- RTF = Rural Task Force
- SNC = Safer Neighbourhood Command – Area of Policing attributed to
- Sus Circs = Suspicious Circumstances – includes Insecure premises and Vehicles
- TIC = Taken Into Consideration is typically where an offender admits to further offences to avoid potentially being pursued for these at a later date.
