Domestic Abuse

"Any incident or pattern of incidents of controlling, coercive or threatening behaviour, violence or abuse between those aged 16 or over who are, or have been, intimate partners or family members regardless of gender or sexuality. This can encompass but is not limited to the following types of abuse:

- Psychological
- Physical
- Financial
- Sexual
- Emotional

Controlling behaviour can be a range of acts designed to make a person subordinate and/or dependent on another by isolating them from sources of support, exploiting their resources and capacities for personal gain, depriving them of the means needed for independence, resistance and escape and regulating their everyday behaviour.

Coercive behaviour is: an act or a pattern of acts of assault, threats, humiliation and intimidation or other abuse that is used to harm, punish, or frighten their victim."





National Findings


- Police recorded crime data show an increase in offences flagged as domestic abuse-related during the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, however, there has been a gradual increase in police recorded domestic abuse-related offences over recent years as police have improved their recording of these offences; therefore it cannot be determined whether this increase can be directly attributed to the coronavirus pandemic.
- The number of domestic violence remedy orders shows a mixed picture; the weekly number of non-molestation applications, and the number of orders granted from mid-April to the end of June were above the pre-lockdown baseline, while the weekly number of occupation orders granted between March and the end of June were generally below the pre-lockdown baseline.
- London's Metropolitan police service received an increased number of calls-for-service for domestic incidents following the lockdown, largely driven by third-party calls; this is likely because people were spending more time at home during this period.
- There has generally been an increase in demand for domestic abuse victim services during the coronavirus pandemic, particularly affecting helplines as lockdown measures eased; this does not necessarily indicate an increase in the number of victims, but perhaps an increase in the severity of abuse being experienced, and a lack of available coping mechanisms such as the ability to leave the home to escape the abuse, or attend counselling.
- The total number of cases discussed at multi-agency risk assessment conferences (MARACs) decreased in April to June 2020 compared with the previous quarter; this may reflect the difficulties high-risk victims faced when attempting to safely contact the police (the main source of referral to MARACs) during the lockdown period

Demands – Crimes and Occurrences





Reported Domestic Abuse Crimes (2019-2021)




Levels within North Yorkshire








Domestic Abuse - Locally








Predicted demands for Domestic Abuse











Non-Molestation Order Operational Pilot

North Yorkshire Police and its partner agencies have been engaged in exploring the options for locally improving the services offered to victims/survivors of DA, focusing on the effective use of NMO's in the first instance. The aim of the pilot is to:

- Improve communications between the courts and the police with regards to the issue and distribution of NMO's;
- Improve the business process ensuring that NMO's are managed more effectively ensuring the safeguarding of the NMO applicant is paramount
- Ensure that operational staff are aware of the existence and full details of NMO's nationally /locally and understand local policy on the preventative measures deployed to safeguard the public by all partner agencies;
- Improve the effective use of NMO's to ensure that victims receive better protection and reduce the number of repeat DA incidents;
- Identify best practice in this business area, in preparation for the introduction of the new Domestic Abuse Act and the introduction of new orders in 2021. The Government's commitment to DA is further highlighted in the March 2021 budget commitment of £19M for domestic violence programmes;
- Utilise the Police National Database (an existing asset) to support North Yorkshire Police and partner agency activity in this and other business areas to support crime prevention, investigation and safeguarding in the North Yorkshire policing jurisdiction
